People bought a record 8,698 Clark County homes during 2002

According to Benchmarks, real estate tracking service, buyers acquired 8,698 new and used homes in Clark County during the past year, an all-time record.

The sales exceeded last year by 361 homes and were 199 more than the previous record year, 1999.

Vancouver Realtor **Carol Curtis** says that the lowest mortgage interest rates in at least a decade contributed to increased sales.

According to Curtis, 2003 is starting out just as hot.

Seven county school districts asking voters to approve replacement levies

Voters in seven Clark County school districts are being asked to approve replacement levies to maintain current levels of maintenance and operation at a special election Tuesday, Feb. 4.

Most of the special levies do not involve increased taxes, and in most cases the tax take may go down slightly.

About 70 percent of public school funding comes from the state and about 11 percent from federal sources. The remainder is almost always dependent on voter-approved special levies.

Absentee ballots are going into the mail today, according to county elections supervisor **Tim Likness**.

Port of Kalama gets rights to 5 million gallons of water a day

The Port of Kalama has been awarded two separate ground water permits to allow the port to use up to five million gallons of water a day.

The water rights issued by the Washington State Department of Ecology are important in bringing in new industry to the port area, reports port commissioner **Fred Swanstrom**. In the past, the port has had to pass up large industrial clients who required water in excess of that currently available, according to port planning manager **Mark Wilson**.
