Council to pick new member tonight

Starting at about 3:30 p.m. today, under the glare of CVTV, Channel 23, cameras in City Hall, one by one each of eight applicants for the Vancouver City Council job vacated by **Jim Moeller** will have 20 minutes to answer the same set of six questions.

The questions, not yet propounded, will be suggested by each councilmember and the mayor after the council begins its workshop session at 3 p.m.

The candidates will have arrived earlier and by lot will have determined theorder of their appearance. None of the candidates will hear the others' questions and answers until after they have themselves given answers.

Afterward, the city council will go into executive session to review what they heard, and when they convene their regular session at 7 p.m. they will vote to select the successor to the job Moeller left to become a 49th District Democratic state representative They will not make their selection in executive session, but only in the public meeting.

The candidates are Marc Berg, John Caton, Stephen Fitton, D. Michael Heywood, Michael Kissinger, Tim Leavitt, Lisa Morrison and Michael Teefy.

The newest councilmember will be sworn in Monday, Jan. 27, and must run in November 2003 if he or she wants to retain the job.
