John Donnelly retiring as executive director of Pearson Air Museum



John Donnelly, retired Air Force Colonel and the first executive director of Pearson Air Museum, is retiring at the end of this month.

Donnelly, who retired from the Air Force just over ten years ago, joined the Pearson Field Historical Society and helped build a master plan for a new museum. In partnership with the City of Vancouver and One Place Across Time, Donnelly's plan earned a \$3 million investment from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust. During his tenure, Donnelly helped write grants that provided funding for aircraft, exhibits, documentaries and new storage space.

Donnelly tripled the membership of the museum, increased the operating budget ten fold and increased the museum's assets to more than \$1.5 million.

Gary Fuquay, also a retired Air Force colonel, who is the museum's volunteer coordinator, will serve as interim director through the end of the year. Fuquay is a former manager of the Santa Rose, Calif., Air Museum. A nationwide search will be conducted to find Donnelly's successor.

A farewell party for Donnelly will be at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 13.
