## Community foundation grows to \$36 million, gives back to the community \$3.2 million

The Community Foundation for Southwest Washington, which has grown to \$36 million in assets over the past 20 years, last year made grants and gifts to community services of \$3,246,945, according to foundation president **Nancy Sourek**.

Serving Clark, Cowlitz and Skamania Counties, the foundation holds and manages assets of its own as well as assets of many other charitable organizations.

"We provide personal management service to charitable-minded individuals and organizations," Sourek says.

In 2003, the foundation distributed \$1,487,469 for community improvements and conservation, \$598,124 for scholarships and education, \$541,130 for health and human services, \$495,643 on children's issues, \$60,710 for arts, humanities and culture, and \$63,878 on behalf of other organizations.
