Vancouver Housing Authority opens 162-unit Plum Meadows



Vancouver Housing Authority's affordable housing Plum Meadows complex in Fruit Valley opens tomorrow

U. S. Sen. **Maria Cantwell** (D-Wash.) will dedicate the Vancouver Housing Authority's 162-affordable housing complex, Plum Meadows, in Fruit Valley at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 19.

The complex of cottages and apartments is one of the largest ever completed by the housing authority here. Described by VHA spokesperson **LaVon Holden** as "high-quality affordable homes," the units range from studio apartments to three-bedroom residences, with gas fireplaces. In addition to the living units, there are two playgrounds and a community building. All homes will be available to households earning 60 percent of the area median income or below, according to Holden.

Plum Meadows is a partnership among the housing authority, the Vancouver School District and the Fruit Valley Neighborhood Association. Plum Meadows is at the site of the former Fruit Valley Grade School, which was replaced by a new school nearby which opened in 2002.

Developed by the VHA, the project was financed with \$9.1 million in private activity bonds through the state Housing Finance Commission, \$6 mil-

lion in tax-credit equity, \$1 million from the state Housing Trust Fund, and \$300,000 in federal Housing and Urban Development HOME funds.
