Craig Pridemore hits the campaign trail

Clark County Commissioner **Craig Pridemore**, a Democrat, will challenge Republican Sen. Don Carlson.

Pridemore, 42, is serving his second four-year-term as a county commissioner. Carlson, 65, has served in the Washington State Legislature for 11 years and is considered a moderate.

Though the word was out late last week, Pridemore will officially announce his candidacy today at a meeting of Clark County Democrats.

The news has created quite a stir, with the community abuzz about the implications of Pridemore's decision at both the county and state levels. Clark County commissioner **Judie Stanton** has already announced she will not run for reelection. Pridemore will remain in his current office while running the campaign.
