SWMC, southern Washington's largest employer with over 3,200 on the payroll, is served by 520 medical staff members, who support 32 different medical specialty services in programs, focused on cancer, heart, emergency, trauma, neuro-musculoskeletal, family birth and primary care.

County growth rate accelerates

Clark Public Utilities added 416 new families to its list of customers during August, bringing the annual growth rate for the county to 2.86 percent. The rate of growth for all of 2003 was 2.65 percent, when the electric utility signed up 4,011 customers. Through Aug. 31, this year Clark's residential customer base has grown by 2,937 families.

Revenues from residential customers and combined commercial and industrial customers were both above budget for the month, reported the utility's chief financial officer **Rick Dyer**. The industrial and commercial power use suggests an economic turn-around in Clark County, according to Dyer.
