Oregon natural gas customers hit with rate increase; Clark County not far behind

Oregon NW Natural gas customers will see rate increases of 18 percent for residential customers and 20 percent for commercial customers, the Oregon Public Utility Commission agreed Tuesday.

NW Natural last Friday filed for a 20 percent residential natural gas rate hike with the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission. If approved, the new rate would become effective Nov. 1.

The increase for the average residential customer, who uses about 65 therms a month, would add \$12.51 to an average monthly bill of \$62.96.

Soaring wholesale rates for natural gas, reflecting a balance between supply and demand, is the root cause for NW Natural's requests for rate increases, according to **Randy Friedman**, NW Natural's gas supply manager. Some of the higher cost is for construction of a new transmission line and a new temporary adjustment charge.

Friedman adds: "The gas price outlook may be improving. Many industry experts believe that as new supplies, such as liquefied natural gas from other countries enter the American market, wholesale gas prices will stabilize and possibly decrease."
