**Kate Budd** has been appointed emergency shelter clearinghouse coordinator for the Council for the Homeless.

Budd has several years' experience working in homeless management and shelter operations. She earned a masters degree in social work from Eastern Washington University.

The council, formed in 1998, is charged with mobilizing the community to end homelessness in Clark County.

Budd will manage the Clark County Emergency Shelter Hotline and she will be responsible for the council's Voice Mail Program, which provides free voice mail services for 600 homeless and phoneless people in the Clark County. The emergency shelter hotline is manned seven days a week by 20 volunteers, who help assist homeless people find shelter in the county.
