## Herbert Walker presented delayed Bronze Star from Congressman Baird

A Bronze Star for the heroism that Vancouver's **Herbert Walker** displayed over 50 years ago in central Europe was presented by U.S. Rep. **Brian Baird** today. Baird had helped Walker pursue his claim for the medal and citation.

Walker, on Feb. 20, 1945, was a T-5 with the 90th Reconnaissance Troop, taking part in a battle in Germany when American infantrymen were forced to withdraw from a fight leaving 22 wounded soldiers exposed to heavy small arms and artillery fire. Although enemy fire was concentrated on him, Walker moved a 1/4-ton vehicle to an exposed position and provided steady machine gun fire to cover an aid party which was able to rescue all of the wounded.

Baird is also helping Walker pursue a claim for a Silver Star and a Purple Heart.
