Travel industry a top Clark County employer

If the travel industry in Clark County were a single company, it would rank as one of the top employers in the county, right up with Southwest Washington Medical Center—over 3,200 employees—and Vancouver's two large school districts, Evergreen and Vancouver, each with over 2,200 employees.

Kim Bennett, president of the Southwest Washington Convention & Visitors Bureau, estimates travel-related workers in the county earned a total of \$78 million last year. If these jobs paid \$30,000 a year, that would account for over 2,600 employees, working travel-related jobs.

In 2004, according to state statistics, travelers to Clark County spent \$280 million, getting here, staying here, eating here and buying gifts.

Yesterday Bennett held a news conference in the Vancouver Barracks' E. B. Hamilton Room and stated SWCBV, a nonprofit organization funded primarily by a \$2-per-night hotel tax paid by the occupant, is going to step up efforts to make certain potential travelers know that Southwest Washington is a major destination.

Bennett unveiled a series of illustrations by local artist **Jim Torson** that will be used in advertising and promotional materials. Torson's illustrations depict southern Washington tourist sites.

According to Bennett, Vancouver and southern Washington is a destination for more and more visitors, and the reasons for this are Mount St. Helens, the Columbia River Gorge, all the elements that make up the Vancouver National Historic Reserve, including Vancouver Barracks, Pearson Field and the Fort Vancouver National Monument sites. According to the organization's website, The Pacific Ocean and Mount Hood are also within a one— or two-hour drive from Vancouver.

The new Hilton Vancouver Washington Hotel, opening next week, will increase the county's hotel capacity by over ten percent, to more than 2,400 rooms.

Last year, the SWCVB distributed 80,000 visitor guides and brochures.

Fewer crashes on Fourth Plain Boulevard

Vancouver's Fourth Plain Boulevard Traffic Safety Project has resulted in a 24 percent decrease in automobile accidents and a 38 percent decrease in injury-related traffic accidents.

The project affects Fourth Plain Boulevard between St. Johns Road and Vancouver Mall Drive. The principal reason for the success of the project has been traffic enforcement. In the first three months of this year, police made 750 stops, cited 489 drivers and issued 235 verbal warnings. Police also made eight drunk-driving arrests and cited 15 drivers for driving with suspended licenses.

Clean Water Act bills going to 60.000

About 60,000 Clark County residents in unincorporated areas will be getting their annual Clean Water bills in the mail, reports **Earl Rowell**, county water resources manager.

The average residential fee is about \$33.

The program is in its sixth year.
