Just last month the Vancouver City Council expanded the housing authority's role in the community by designating a public development authority, enabling the organization to take an expanded role in creating projects similar to the city's own downtown redevelopment.

One of the first is expected to involve the commercially developing Fourth Plain Boulevard corridor.

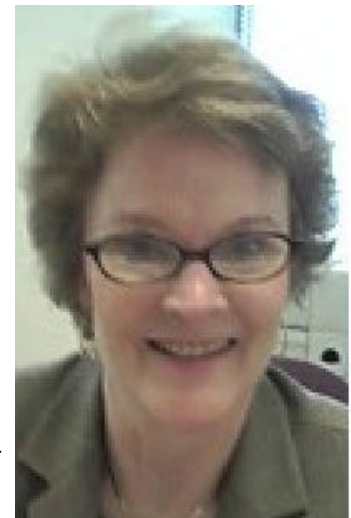
Kalama Saturday Market and Antique Street Fair opens
