Voter registration deadline today

The deadline to register to vote in the November general election is 5 p.m. today at the Clark County Elections Department, 1408 Franklin Street.

The official election date is Tuesday, Nov.8, but the election is being conducted entirely by mail.

Local races, except for Clark County Commissioner, District 3 are non partisan. **Steve Stewart**, Democrat, who was appointed to the three-member board of commissioners last December is being challenged by former 18h District state representative Republican **Tom Mielke**.

There are a half dozen statewide issues, the most significant of which is Initiative 912, which calls for a repeal of the 9.5-cent gasoline tax approved by the last session of the state legislature. If I-912 is approved it will affect nearly a quarter of a million dollars of state and local highway projects in Clark County.

Local issues include the proposed library remodel and expansion and a Ridgefield School District property acquisition for a future high school.
