Historian, public power advocate Gus Norwood dies at the age of 90

Gus Norwood, author, historian, former executive director of the Northwest Public Power Association, and U.S. Naval Academy graduate, who was active in Democratic politics, died yesterday at the age of 90.

Mr. Norwood recently had been in poor health.

His ninth and most recent book, *Twelve Careers*, completed last year, was autobiographical in nature, chronicling his life for his children. It includes his Navy service overseas in World War II, his 20 years as head of the NWPPA ending in 1967, and his service as the first administrator of the Alaska Power Administration.

While Norwood was headquartered in Vancouver for the NWPPA, his wife, **Jean**, was elected to the Vancouver City Council.

Mr. Norwood was active in the process that brought agreements between the city of Vancouver and the U.S. Park Service that resulted in co-existence of the Fort Vancouver National Monument site south of Vancouver Barracks and Pearson Field east of the fort site.

Mr. Norwood rose to the rank of Lt. Commander in the Navy while serving in the south Pacific and Japan. Before finally retiring, Mr. Norwood worked for the Bonneville Power Administration and wrote the history of that organization.

A service for Mr. Norwood is at 5:30 p.m. Monday, May 8, in the Unitarian Fellowship, 4505 E 18th Street.
