U.S. Rep. **Brian Baird** (D-3rd) is bringing the first of a series of northwest salmon survival meetings to Vancouver at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 11, in the Water Resources Education Center, 4600 Columbia Way.

The Congressional meetings will focus on the survival of returning adult salmon and steelhead and will bring together various stakeholders and interested parties from both the public and private sectors.

Witnesses at the Congressional meetings are by invitation only, although written testimony may be submitted and the public is invited to attend.

The meetings are being conducted by Baird and Washington U.S Rep. **Norm Dicks** (D-6th) and Oregon U.S. Rep. **Greg Walden** (R-2nd).
