Primary ballots must be postmarked today or taken to drop-off locations by 8 p.m.

Another 7,259 absentee ballots were received by the Clark County Elections Department this morning, bringing the total to 67,387, out of 176,278 mailed from the county Auditor's office, for a 38 percent return so far, and with ballots arriving in tomorrow's mail and being dropped off at 31 locations in the county before 8 p.m., the total vote is expected to go well over 40 percent, a surprising turnout for a nearly ho-hum primary election.

The C-TRAN request for a .2 percent increase in sales tax to maintain current service is thought to be the driver for the big numbers.

Voters may drop off their mail ballots until 8 p.m. today at 31 locations in the county, including the county Elections Department office, 1408 Franklin Street.
