Ed Little named president and principal of St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton Catholic High School

Ed Little, retiring veteran Vancouver School District administrator, has been appointed founding president and principal of St. Elizabeth Ann Seaton Catholic High School, **Alexander J. Brunett**, archbishop of the Seattle archdiocese, announced today.

Little will oversee the design and construction of the new high school. He will assist the board and **Kathy McDonald**, director of development, in the fundraising effort of the capital campaign in Clark, Cowlitz, Wahkiakum and Skamania Counties.

When the high school is completed in Ridgefield, Little will oversee the educational operations of the school.

Little is retiring this year after 31 years with the Vancouver School District. Since 2003 he has been principal of Skyview High School. He also served as principal of Alki and Gaiser Middle Schools and Martin Luther King and Lieser Elementary Schools.

In addition to his experience as an educator, Little was president of the Washington State University Alumni Association Board and served as a board member since 1991. He is a former member of the Washington State University Vancouver advisory council. Little was also president of the National Coalition for Equity in Education for three years.
