Port adopts "Pay as We Grow" plan

The largest budget in the history of the Port of Vancouver was approved by commissioners today. The \$83.2 million budget for 2008includes \$48.9 million set aside to buy the former Alcoa aluminum smelter plant on the Columbia River and \$20.4 million for the West Vancouver Freight Access rail project.

Earlier this year the port used its statutory power to pay for the Alcoa acquisition and rail project by a port tax, which became the subject of a successful local referendum that was overwhelmingly approved by port district voters.

The port was left without the financing from the tax proposal and port commissioner **Arch Miller**, who championed the project, was defeated in this November's general election.

Miller, whose term on the port commission extends to January, and the other two commissioners made the vote on the new budget unanimous.

Under the "Pay as We Grow" plan, financing for the property acquisition and the rail project will include a mixture of port reserves, bonds and possibly loans.

At the same time, port commissioners postponed development of the Columbia Gateway project in order to finance what they consider more critical needs.
