Statewide unemployment still under 5 percent

Washington's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose to 4.9 percent in March, up .4 percentage points from February's near-record-low of 4.5 percent, according to the state Employment Security Department.

The rise in unemployment was accompanied by a 3,200 decline of non-agricultural jobs. It was the first month-over-month decline in the number of jobs in Washington since September 2007.

"March was the 18th month in a row that Washington's unemployment was under 5 percent," said Employment Security Commissioner **Karen Lee**.

However, seasonally unadjusted employment figures tell a different story. Unadjusted employment rates include all categories of employment, including part-time employees and sole proprietors.

Statewide that unemployment rate was 5.3 percent. In Clark County the rate was 6.9 percent, but it showed an increase of 1,620 people at work over the previous month.

Out of a Clark County labor force of 216,630 persons, 201,750 were at work in March, according to the labor department.
