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Contributions to SWMC break all records

First launched as a \$15 million campaign by Southwest Washington Medical Center to help pay for what is now known as the Firstenburg Tower on the Mill Plain Boulevard campus, the community campaign, now concluded, raised a record shattering \$53.5 million, the most money ever raised in southern Washington for a single cause.

More than \$30 million of the total came from the families of the co-chairs of the multi-year campaign, Jeanne Firstenburg and David Nierenberg.

All totaled, nearly 20,000 gifts were tabulated. Included was over \$1.5 million contributed by employees and physicians at the region's largest hospital.

No sooner than the results of the campaign were made known, the Southwest Washington Medical Center Foundation announced a new \$6 million campaign to help finance the cost of additional patient rooms in the Firstenburg Tower, construction of a Breast Care Center, acquisition of a robotic surgery system, and endowments for hospice programs, Healthy Steps Women's and Children's Center and Family Medicine Southwest Washington.

The medical center's foundation manages assets of over \$42 million, primarily for community health programs and for emerging medical technology.

Families who contributed \$1 million or more to the initial campaign, in addition to Firstenburg and Nierenberg, and two anonymous contributors are Corky and Linda Angelo, David and Diane Difford, Ray Hickey, Lee and Connie Kearney, and Ed and Dollie Lynch.

Cantwell takes green energy message to hustings

U.S. Sen. Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.) took her wind-power tax-credit message to a Port of Vancouver audience Monday, where most of the wind power machinery enters the Pacific Northwest.

Cantwell is the champion of a federal 1.5-cent tax credit offered for wind-power developers that helps make that green energy competitive for electric customers.

Cantwell is working in Congress to extend the tax credit by at least two years, she says.

According to a Vestas vice president, **Roby Roberts**, Cantwell has been a "tiger" on the tax credit issue.

Vestas is the company that supplies northwest wind farms with the huge machines that churn out electricity from the winds of eastern Washington and Oregon. The machinery is shipped through the Port of Vancouver. Wind blades are so gigantic that they stretch from one intersection to the next when being trucked east through Vancouver.

According to Port of Vancouver executive director Larry Paulson, during 2007 305 wind-turbine assemblies passed through the port's docks. He predicts a greater volume for 2008.

Currently the northwest is generating 2,000 megawatts of electric power annually, the equivalent of two Bonneville Dams, Cantwell says.

Green industry is very big in the northwest, according to Cantwell. She says that there are 241 organizations working in the clean energy industry in the state of Washington. Revenues are \$2.1 billion annually, she says, compared to \$1.9 billion in the logging industry and \$1.7 billion in the coffee/espresso shop industry."
