C-Tran board approves fare increase

Following several open houses and public outreach that culminated in a public hearing last night, the C-TRAN Board of Directors voted to approve a fare increase that takes effect September 1, 2010. After listening to testimony and considering previously submitted written comments, the board approved the proposal with one change: reduction of the proposed increase on monthly Express passes from \$115 to \$110. The approved increases are as follows:

Cash Fares

- Most cash fares increase by \$.05
- Express cash fares increase by \$.25
- Most ticket books increase by \$.50
- Express ticket books increase by \$2.50
- No change to Honored Citizen ticket books for senior and disabled passengers.

Day Passes

- C-Zone increases by \$.25
- GoAnywhere (Express) increases by \$.50

Monthly Passes

- Adult passes increase by \$2.00
- Honored, Reduced/Low-Income, & Youth passes increase by \$1.00
- Express passes increase by \$5.00

Discontinued Fares

- C-VAN All Zone monthly pass- eliminated
- Reduced & Agency All-Zone monthly passes eliminated
- Summer Blast Pass All-Zone eliminated
- Event Group Fare eliminated

New Fares

- C-VAN C-Zone Monthly Pass \$48.00
- Summer Blast Pass C-Zone \$54.00

Additional changes will also be made to the eligibility requirements for Honored Citizen (senior and disabled categories), as well as ID requirements for the Youth/Student and Child categories.
